Psychologists will dissect every inch of Holmes' life in order to find an answer for why such a seemingly intelligent person would do such a bizarre, brutal, disgusting thing. But Holmes doesn't deserve that much attention. The attention should be given to the victims...and to ourselves.

The victims were shot while watch-

ing a movie. I am sure that everyone who is reading this has been inside a movie theater. I also know that no one reading this ever thought that their life would end before a movie ended. We are trained to think that death is reserved for the elderly or the reckless, not for the young and the healthy. The Aurora, CO shooting spree reminds us that death can come at any minute of any day. James, the half-brother of Jesus, said, "Yet you do not know what your life will be like tomorrow. You are just a vapor that appears for a little while and then vanishes away" (James 4:14).

Another lesson learned from the shooting is one that seems cheap,

but it is still relevant. Your parents or grandparents may have said, "Be careful where you go. You don't want to be caught dead some places." In other words, it would be embarrassing to your family and your legacy if you were to die in a place of ill-repute. Be careful where you go.

We also see in this incident the depth of human depravity. When someone does not submit their life to the will of God, there is no end to their sinfulness. Our world will change when we appreciate the few days we have, and encourage others to follow Christ.
