The Company We Keep

King David committed grievous sins one night, and that one night-that one solitary evening-changed his life forever. He was in Jerusalem while Joab, his servants, and the rest of Israel were out besieging Rabbah. He rose from his bed at evening for unknown reasons. Maybe he couldn't sleep. Maybe he heard something and he went to investigate. Maybe he just wanted to see what Jerusalem looked like empty. Or maybe he knew that Bathsheba, a woman "very beautiful in appearance" (II Sam. 11:2), would be bathing on her roof at that time. Why he got out of his bed makes no difference. What he did after he got out of his bed makes all the difference.

David summoned the woman to his house, slept with her, and she became pregnant. In an effort to hide his sin, he summoned Bathsheba's husband, Uriah, from the battle so he could spend the night with his wife. But her husband refused. David then sent Uriah to the front of the war to be killed, and that's what happened.

I wonder if any of that would've ever happened if David had been surrounded by faithful friends and family that night. I wonder what would've happened if there were people there to distract him from staring at a naked woman. It's safe to say that David wouldn't have coveted and then committed adultery and murder.

What if the other apostles were standing around that fire with Peter when he was asked if he was one that knew Jesus? What if Eve knew that God was aware of her conversation with the serpent? First Corinthians 15:33 states, "Bad company corrupts good character." But we also see many examples of where no company has weakened the character of otherwise faithful people. Good company promotes good character.

Criticism

In the same way I know that someone with zero dollars would rather have one hundred dollars, I know that all people would rather be encouraged than criticized. Granted, some people *deal* with criticism better than others, but that doesn't mean they would rather be criticized than encouraged. We typically divide criticism into two categories-constructive and destructive. Constructive criticism is rare but needed at times. Winston Churchill said, "Criticism be not be agreeable, but it is necessary. It fulfills the same function as pain in the human body. It calls attention to an unhealthy state of things."

Destructive criticism is common, hurtful, and debilitating if not addressed. Since we usually avoid our enemies, destructive criticism most often comes from those who say they love us. It can come from teachers, coaches, family, and friends.

Maybe the most frustrating part of destructive criticism is that the criticizers rarely offer solutions to the problems they observe. The Athenian painter Apollodorus had this inscription above a stack of his paintings: "Tis no hard thing to reprehend me; but let the men who blame me mend me." The criticizers also are the ones who are not as skilled as those they are criticizing. Criticizers tend to take shots at those who are more popular, more attractive, and more successful. After Philip II of Macedon, the father of Alexander the Great, destroyed the city of Olynthus in 348 B.C., a resident of Olynthus said, "But he cannot build another such."

Tearing someone down is easy. It takes no talent, courage, or wisdom to pick apart someone's activities. It does, however, take talent, courage, and wisdom to teach, encourage, and patiently assist someone when they need it.
