When Loss Is Gain

Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827) composed nine symphonies, five concertos for piano, thirty-two piano sonatas, and sixteen string quartets. He is considered by many to be the most famous and influential composer in the history of the world. Yet, despite his fame and immeasurable talent, Beethoven carried a heavy burden throughout his early years: He feared that one day he would lose his hearing. He assumed, logically, that if he could not hear, he could not compose music. His worst fear became reality when, in 1796 at the age of 26, Beethoven contracted tinnitus, a ringing in the ears that progresses into deafness.

He sunk into depression. He was tormented by thoughts of suicide as his hearing gradually faded. But he didn't stop working. When he played his 9th Symphony for the first time, he couldn't hear the thunderous applause from the audience. He spent the last 13 years of his life totally deaf, but still capable of composing the world's greatest music.

Often our greatest fear becomes our greatest gain. Paul's "thorn in the flesh" tormented him. He prayed three times that God would remove it. I believe that if God had removed Paul's thorn, Paul would have still been a faithful missionary to the Gentiles. But God

did not remove it. Since Paul was forced to accept it, he learned a great lesson about himself and God.

"Most gladly, therefore, I will rather boast about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. Therefore I am well content with weaknesses..." (II Cor. 12:9-10).

Deficiencies are not burdens; they are simply avenues by which God's power can be shown to the world. "For we who live are constantly being delivered over to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our mortal flesh" (II Cor. 4:11).
