Curtis Reeves had enough. The 71-year-old Tampa, FL resident was trying to enjoy a movie, but the man sitting in front of him, Chad Oulson, wouldn't stop texting. Reeves asked Oulson to stop, but Oulson refused. He asked again, but Oulson told Reeves to mind his own business. A heated argument ensued. What happened next is mind-boggling but almost common in our culture today: Curtis Reeves pulled a handgun from his pants pocket and shot Chad Oulson and Chad's wife, Nichole. Chad was pronounced dead on the scene; Nichole survived her injuries. Curtis Reeves was detained by an off-duty

sheriff's deputy and charged with 2nd degree murder.

Sometimes you just have to let it go. Even when your blood is pumping; even when all you want to do is exact revenge; even when you think someone deserves the last piece of mind you have left; you have to let it go. The temporary satisfaction that comes from getting even is quickly swallowed up by the lasting consequences of your impulsive actions.

"Cooler heads prevail."
"Fools rush in where angels fear to tread." "Count to ten." "You can't get ahead if you're always trying to get even." And so on. You've

heard all of those types of statements before. Some seem corny, but they're all true. Our culture often promotes and praises rash behavior, and then mocks those who face the consequences. Manhood is often defined by how aggressive a man can be.

The Bible states, "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger" (Prov. 15:1). Man will continue to think that harsh words solve problems, but they don't. Just ask Curtis Reeves. He'll likely spend the next 25 years wishing he would've let it go.

Pretty Enough
