The Desire To Be Mr. Hyde

Scottish author Robert Louis Stevenson wrote a novella titled *The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde*, which was published in 1886. It is a story about Dr. Jekyll, a respected man in London, who wanted to indulge in anti-social behavior. So he concocted a potion that could transform his entire person—mind, body, and soul—into Mr. Hyde, a sociopath. That way Dr. Jekyll could perform his wicked deeds without detection.

His potion worked all too well. He was able to drink the potion and become Mr. Hyde and then morph back into Dr. Jekyll again, but eventually the potion lost its effectiveness. He remained in his Mr. Hyde persona much longer than he de-

sired. He knew that Mr. Hyde's true identity would soon be discovered. Dr. Jekyll's came to the conclusion that the only way to stop Mr. Hyde was to kill himself.

There are a lot of Dr. Jekylls in the world today—men and women who desire to live for the world one moment, and then quickly jump back into the ways of the Lord. But like Dr. Jekyll eventually realized, it becomes harder and harder to live in both worlds.

When Satan grabs you, he doesn't want to let go. He wants to desensitize you. He wants you to think that the will of God is strange, abnormal, and boring. Once he has convinced you of that, you think that going

back to God is an impossible task. But it's not.

The parable of the Prodigal Son teaches us that (1.) we spiral out of control when we give ourselves to the world's standards of happiness, and (2.) we can return to God and be greeted by the open arms of our loving Father.

The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde doesn't need to be the title of your biography. But it will be if your intentions are the same as Dr. Jekyll's.
