Showing Respect

All these verses center on respect: "Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind regard one another as more important than yourselves" (Phil.

2:3). "Be devoted to one another in brotherly love; give preference to one another in honor" (Rom. 12:10). "You shall rise up before the greyheaded and honor the aged, and you shall revere your God; I am the Lord" (Lev. 19:32).

Each generation of Americans seems to be less respectful than the previous one. Why? Because being fair has taken the place of being respectful. Some think fairness and respectfulness are the same thing, but they're not. Fairness focuses on self—"I must receive the same things as everyone around me." Respect focuses on others—"Are the people around me receiving the honor they deserve?"

How can you show respect? Listen more than you talk. Put down your cell phone when you're with company. Say "yes, sir" and "yes, ma'am" to seniors. Don't manipulate the system to your advantage-play by the rules. Agree to disagree, and put your weapons down. Be quick to compliment and slow to criticize. Rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep. Say little when you win and less when you lose. Remember that the world doesn't owe you anything. But numbers don't always tell the whole story.
