a workman who does not need to be ashamed, accurately handling the word of truth" (II Tim. 2:15). I am not saying we should be "openminded," which is usually just a code for "keep reading until you can validate what you want to do." I mean study to grasp large concepts; study to memorize long passages; study to define unusual words; and study to be able to share those results with others. This means we must set aside time and be diligent in our work. You'll always find the time to do what you *really* want to do.

You'll be amazed at what you'll find.

### Surely The Matter Has Become Known

Moses was a murderer.

That fact gets lost in the burning bush, the exodus, and the receiving of the law on Mount Sinai. But it still happened. Moses, a Hebrew who was raised in an Egyptian house, saw an Egyptian abusing a fellow Hebrew. He looked both ways, then he killed the Egyptian. The next day, Moses saw two Hebrews fighting. When he tried to intervene, one Hebrew asked, "Who made you a prince or a judge over us? Are you intending to kill me as you killed the Egyptian?" (Ex. 2:14). Moses then made a profound statement: "Surely the matter has become known," and he fled to Midian.

Moses overestimated the magical powers of looking both ways. His sin still became known. But Moses wasn't the only person in Scripture who tried to get away with it. Adam tried to hide from God (Gen. 3:10). Cain played dumb (Gen. 4:9). Ananias and Sapphira tried to pull a fast one on the apostles (Acts 5:4). In every case, the matter still became known.

There are many sins that will go unnoticed by men, but they will never be concealed from God. Jeremiah 17:10 states: "I, the Lord, search the heart, I test the mind, even to give to each man according to his ways, according to the results of his deeds."

The fact that God sees all should not make us tremble. He not only knows our sins, but He also knows our private generosities and personal confessions (Matt. 6:4,6). We never have to introduce ourselves to God or convince Him that we are someone else. Therefore, He can be fully trusted.

"If we say that we have no sin, we are deceiving ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:8-9).
