Failing to gain access into the house through the front door, shortly after midnight the desperate woman climbed onto the roof, took off her clothes, and tried to slide down the chimney. Her plan failed, of course. It took firemen over 2 hours to dismantle the chimney and free the woman. She had minor injuries and major embarrassment.

Ex-Mrs. Hernandez tried to

enter the house her way—a different, alternative, ill-advised way—and she failed to accomplish her goal.

Pecked To Death

A Madison, Wisconsin woman noticed a few scratches on her newly washed and waxed car on Monday. On Tuesday, there were more scratches, and they were deeper than the day before. It didn't take the woman long to figure out what was going on: A flock of turkeys were pecking on her car early in the morning; they fled when she walked outside. Evidently the turkeys saw their own reflection in the car, and they were doing their best to attack themselves.

Have you ever been constantly pecked by someone else? They won't leave you alone. They borrow a little money here, take too much of your time there, and then offer unsolic-

ited advice for everything you do. Emotionally, it's draining. It causes the relationship to die from a thousand pecks. So, how can you prevent being pecked to death?

- (1). Communicate. Tact is the ability to make a point without making an enemy. If someone can't see how their pecking is hurting you, find a private moment to tell them. Avoidance doesn't solve any problem.
- (2). Avoid being readily available. You have the right to your own time. You have responsibilities. Those around you need to know that they do not have the ultimate right to your time and energy. Establish boundaries in your relationships.

(3). Learn to be a good receiver. If you're the one who is always giving, turn the relationship into more than that. Expect the other person to contribute as much as you do. Ask the other person to help you when you're in trouble.

We also need to remember this: You might be pecked by someone who has real problems in their life. While he or she might be annoying, the root cause of the pecking could be something serious. Try to solve the disease first. Once the disease is cured, the pecking will stop.
