The Right Side Of History

"You're on the wrong side of history." That phrase is used by many people as a conversation "stopper"—a way to say that traditional views are now passé, and that there's nothing you can do to stop the things you oppose, whether that's gay marriage, the proliferation of pornography, or the legalization of marijuana. History is moving forward, and you're stuck in the past. It's an adult way to say, "You're not cool."

Faithful people have been on the wrong side of history many times, but that doesn't mean their views were wrong or even short-sighted.

(1) Faithful people opposed illegitimacy. When more and more unmarried couples began living together and

having children together, faithful people said, "No. This is not God's design for families." According to the CDC, 40 percent of all children born today are illegitimate. As that rate increases, so does the delinquency rate.

(2) Faithful people opposed alcohol abortion. Faithful people said that if abortion becomes a constitutional right, abortions would proliferate and be used as a means of birth control. Sixty million abortions later (since *Roe vs. Wade* in 1973), people of faith were right. Cultural progressives still defend killing the unborn while doing little to stem the tide of abortion.

(3) Faithful people currently oppose gay marriage. Same-sex marriage is not commended in Scripture. When Jesus was asked about divorce, He said that marriage begins when man leaves his father and mother and is joined to his wife. Scripture leaves no room for homosexual marriage or homosexuality to be acceptable behavior.

American society will continue to drift further away from godly behavior, even though their "progression" so far has led to increased delinquency, 60 million abortions, and homes where biological parents are absent. Being on the wrong side of history might not be cool, but sometimes it's the right place to be.
