Have This Attitude

I am not Jesus. I do not look like Jesus, aside from the fact that both of us had/have a normal appearance (Isaiah 53:2). Jesus lived in Palestine over 2000 years ago; I live in Tennessee today. He was the only begotten Son of God—fully divine and fully man; I am only human. Jesus was sinless; I am sinful. He is the Savior; I am the saved.

Even though none of us can perfectly emulate the life of Christ, the Bible still commands us—not suggests, commands us—to be like Jesus in one particular way: We must have His attitude. In Philippians 4:5, Paul writes, "Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus..." God

never commanded us to do anything we are incapable of doing; otherwise, He would be a cruel, manipulative God. So, since the Bible commands us to have the attitude of Jesus, we know it's possible.

Paul went on to describe Jesus' attitude. Among other things, "being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phil. 4:8). In order to have the attitude of Christ, we must humble ourselves. As the saying goes, if you don't humble yourself, someone or something will humble you. After Jesus humbled Himself, "God highly exalted

Him" (4:9). Your Christlike humility will have the same effect. James wrote, "Humble yourselves in the presence of the Lord, and He will exalt you" (James 4:10).

How was your attitude to-day? Did you rejoice with those who rejoiced, or were you jealous? Did you consider others as more important than yourself (Phil. 4:3), or did you wonder why others weren't serving you? Did you judge others by their actions while judging yourself by your intentions?

Our faith is more than just what we do. We must also have the right attitude.
