Pride Problem

Do you have a pride problem? Very few people will ever admit they do. They never say the words, "I am better than you," or, "Don't you wish you were as good as me?" Pride is shown in subtle ways. Notice these questions, then ask yourself, "Do I have a pride problem?"

1. Robert Louis Stevenson said, "A good test of egotism is to notice how you listen to others being praised." Do you cringe when someone else is being complimented? Do you think of all the things that person does poorly while they are being lavished with praise? Do you think to yourself, "Why are they getting all the attention? I've done many more important things than they have!" A humble person will join in the praise of someone else. A humble person gives pats on the back.

2. Do you feel that people owe you praise and attention? Do you get upset when your name does not get mentioned in the bulletin or from the pulpit when you perform a service for the church? Do you make a checklist of people who do not send you cards on your birthday or give you a gift at Christmas? A humble person will sincerely thank those who praise them and not hold a grudge against those who do not.

3. Do you constantly look for the negative characteristics of a popular person? If someone is particularly beautiful, do you say, "Sure, but did you see them when they were younger?" or, "You ought to see her with no makeup. Yuck!" A humble person highlights someone's positive characteristics.

4. Do you try to one-up others? Is your story always better than the other person's? Are your life experiences always more interesting?
