Why Study The Old Testament?

I have known many Christians who seem like they resent the Old Testament. They see it as completely useless to their life as a Christian. The books are too long, the names are too strange, the teachings are too complicated. After all, what do the words "Deuteronomy" and "Leviticus" really mean anyway?

On the one hand, they have a point. Christians are not bound by the sacrificial worship commandments of the old law (Heb. 10:1-4). Churches are not led by a special order of priests—all Christians comprise the priesthood today (I Peter 2:5-9). God-appointed, God-gifted prophets no longer bring special messages to the people—God speaks

to us now through Christ (Heb. 1:1-2). But does this mean the entire Old Testament is obsolete just because we are no longer bound by the old law? Of course not!

In Romans 15:4, Paul wrote, "For whatever was written in earlier times was written for our instruction, so that through perseverance and the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope." Here is what many Christians do not understand: Just because the Old Testament *contains* the old law, that doesn't mean that everything in the Old Testament *is* the old law. The books of wisdom—Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon—contain timeless truths that may or may not be

directly related to the old law. The book of Genesis teaches us about the creation of man and the world, the beginning of sin, God's attitude toward sin, and His divine providence.

Finally, we cannot fully understand the New Testament and the life of Christ without the Old Testament. The first prophecy of Christ is in Genesis. Jesus quoted the Old Testament throughout His ministry. Moses, Elijah, Jeremiah, and other famous people from the Old Testament are referenced in the New Testament. The New Testament by itself is an incomplete story of God's redeeming work.
