Discipleship

Matthew 11:28-30: "Come to me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and my burden is light."

Dietrich Bonheoffer was a German theologian and Nazi-dissident. He was imprisoned in a concentration camp during World War II and later hanged as the Nazi regime was collapsing. He wrote this about Matthew 11:28-30: "Those who follow Jesus's commandment entirely, who let Jesus's yoke rest on them without resistance, will find the burden they must bear to be light. In the gentle

pressure of His yoke they will receive the strength to walk in the right path without becoming weary...

Where will the call to discipleship lead those who follow it? What decisions and painful separations will it entail? We must take this question to Him who alone knows the answer. Only Jesus Christ, who bids us follow Him, knows where the path will lead. But we know that it will be a path full of mercy beyond measure. Discipleship is joy."

Do you consider discipleship joy? If not, why not? James said that we should find joy in trials because they produce endurance (James 1:2-3). The apostle Paul was singing with Silas while chained in a Philippian

dungeon. Dietrich Bonheoffer could write about the joy of discipleship knowing that his commitment to Christ would likely lead to his execution. So I ask again: Do you consider discipleship joy?

If you find following Christ to be overly burdensome, have you considered the possibility that your problem is not your circumstances, but rather your faith? Maybe you don't trust God as much as you used to. Maybe your prayer life is not as vibrant as it once was. Don't let your circumstances alter your faith. Let your faith alter your circumstances.
