(2). Character is key. The father in Proverbs chapter

You need the listening ears, compassionate hands, and warm embraces of true friends. But be careful: Don't open your heart to those who would weaken your faith. Surround yourself with those who will help you go to heaven.

Re-Drawing Your Circle

Years ago a preaching friend of mine told me about an article he read by a prominent gospel preacher. It was an article about fellowship, tolerance, and judgment. The author came to this conclusion: I need to stop re-drawing my circle. But what does that mean?

The author started broadly. He said that when he was young, his world was huge. He did not understand the differences between cultures, churches, men and women, anything. Everyone was in his circle. But as he aged, he started to re-draw his circle. He made the circle smaller by only including those who looked like him (white), talked like him (Southern), and went to church regularly. But the re-drawing did not stop there. Later, he decided that even people in his own church could not be included in his circle, so he drew the circle even smaller. Over time he came to the sobering conclusion that eventually he would be the only person left in his circle. The only person he would always agree with was himself. He found a reason to push everyone else out. They were always wrong; he was always right. He soon realized that this re-drawn circle had little to do with what is taught in Scripture and everything to do with judgmentalism and selfishness.

Don't misunderstand: We need to draw lines. But we need to be sure

that we only draw lines where God tells us to draw lines. God never said, "Exclude people from your life if they make you the slightest bit uncomfortable. Run away from a congregation if the elders make a decision that wouldn't be the *exact* decision you would make. Bail out on a marriage at the first sign of trouble. At every opportunity, let it be known that you have it all figured out. Make sure that everyone in your life is *just like you.*"

Stop re-drawing your circle. Love what God loves; hate what God hates. Love your enemies. Bless and do not curse. Make your circle that same size as God's.
