Legalism

Have you ever been accused of being a "legalist"? Do you even know what that term means? Is it a good thing or bad thing to be a "legalist"? What does the Bible say?

First off, let's define the term. As you can see, "legalism" includes the word "legal." So, legalism has to do with adherence to the laws of God. I have never met anyone in my life, from any Christian group, who claims to have kept God's laws perfectly. All believers believe Romans 3:23: "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." But the question is, what role does obedience play in one's salvation?

A legalist approaches God's laws in one of two unbiblical ways. First, there are those who believe that obeying God's laws is an end to itself. That is a sort of "check box" religion. Say the right prayers, attend the right services, give the right money, etc., and God will save you. But that is an obedience that is devoid of love. It is cold-hearted.

Second, there is a legalism that mixes man's traditions with God's laws, and then treats the laws and traditions equally. For instance, a legalist would decide that all matters of faith must be practiced his way—from the order of worship, to whether a church should have a paid youth minister, to whether an elder needs to have multiple children in order to serve in that role. That type of legalist acts as the head of the church. He's the sheriff, regulating all matters of faith. Ancient Pharisees were this type of legalist.

The Bible is clear: We are saved by the grace of God. No amount of good works can earn someone a place in heaven. Since we are saved by grace, and since Jesus is our Lord (Master), we should do everything in our power to demonstrate our faith in Jesus. We do good works because we are saved. We do good works because we love Jesus.

Choose Happiness

"You made me mad!"

How many times have you *heard* it? How many times have you *said* it? How many times has the memory of a certain person or event boiled your blood and ruined your day? We have all felt that way, mainly because our nervous systems are made to respond to distress, and stressful situations are tattooed on our brains. But do you *have to* be mad? Do you *have to* allow your day to be ruined by someone else? Not necessarily. You can choose happiness. But how?

(1). *Protect your mind.* From a Roman dungeon, Paul wrote, "Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is right, what-

ever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is of good repute, if there is any excellence and if anything worthy of praise, dwell on these things" (Phil. 4:8). If you surround yourself with people (or the opinions of people) who are not true, honorable, right, pure, lovely, and of good reputation, you will not be happy.

(2). Get a better perspective on your failings. Some people are miserable because they choose to focus on all the mistakes they ever made. Every bad relationship. Every bad career move. Every bad parenting decision. If you think about your failings, you will always consider yourself a failure. But if you focus on the fact that you are wonderfully made by God

(Psalm 139:14), you will feel like a valuable, special person. And you will be happier.

(3). Count your blessings. It sounds trite, but it is still the best remedy for a sour disposition. Things are never as bad as they seem. You are surrounded by God's blessings. You live in a house that is the envy of billions of people around the world. You have food options. You have access to information. Your cup runs over.

You will have many more bad days. You will be sad again. But there is a path to happiness, and you can control it.
