## The Mission of the Church Lesson 4 - Worship (Part 1)

Having spent the first three lessons of "The Mission of the Church" discussing the organization of the ekklēsia, we now look to scripture to focus on our mission. What is it that God wants His church to be doing? In scripture the mission of the church can be addressed by the following categories that we will be looking at over the next few weeks: **Worship**, **Edification**, **Benevolence**, and **Evangelism**.

This morning we begin by looking at the concept of **Worship** in scripture, and will do this by asking three questions about what God desires from His church in terms of **Worship**:



This should probably be question number two, but if we do not get this one right, the rest of the questions really do not matter. We must be very careful that when we assemble, we are not worshiping the wrong being (Luke 18:9-14). What is our primary motivation for worship? Is it to make ourselves feel better? Is it because we enjoy it? True worship should make us feel better. True worship should be enjoyed by Christians. However, if either of these is the primary motivation, then we need to reexamine the object of our worship.

Forms of the word "Worship" appear 191 times in scripture (113 in the Old Testament and 78 in the New Testament). Whenever worship is mentioned (or praise, thanksgiving, etc.), it is always being directed toward God (**Hebrews 12:28-29; Revelation 14:6-7**). He is the object of our worship. He is the audience, and we are the performers. While we will undoubtedly receive many benefits from the true worship, we must never forget that worship is about God first and foremost.



The Collins English Dictionary defines "Worship" as (Noun) "Reverent honor and homage paid to God or a sacred personage, or to any object

regarded as sacred" and (Verb) "To **render** religious reverence and homage to". From these two definitions, please note the words "paid" and "render."

When reading about worship in scripture, it is never just a feeling and is also never about just going through the motions (i.e. showing up and sitting in a pew). It is an action, an investment, a payment, an offering, a sacrifice given for a specific purpose. We must be careful that we do not confuse emotion with worship. Can true worship create an emotional response? It absolutely should! Is emotion alone a sign of true worship? Not at all. The same is true for just going through the motions. Should we consider merely attending a church gathering as an act of worship? Absolutely not! Worship is a praise offering made to the creator of the universe in view of everything He has done for us (1 Chronicles 16:8-10, 23-27; Hebrews 13:15). This is not an activity that should be taken lightly or haphazardly (Ecclesiastes 5:1-2).

If God is the object of our worship, and worship is a praise offering made to Him, then motivates us (the ekklēsia) to do it? While there are many, many things we could say about the reasons why we should worship God, let's focus on three fundamental concepts:

- **1. We recognize His power and majesty:** He is the all-powerful creator of the universe. He is worthy of our praise and adoration! (1 Chronicles 16:8-10, 23-27; Isaiah 40:28-31)
- **2. We recognize His gift to us:** He has rescued us from certain death, and we are thankful! (Romans 3:19-26; Ephesians 2:1-10)
- **3. We recognize His right to our lives:** He bought us with the blood of His Son, and we owe Him our lives and our worship! (1 Corinthians 6:18-20)
