•	- In Romans 6:1-4 , Paul beautifully describes Baptism as a burial and
resurrection. He is explaining	how in our Baptism, we are partaking in the death and resurrection of Christ. It is sling or pouring allows for the full effect of the intended symbolism.
The examples from scripture also bear out that the practice of Baptism was completed by full immersion in water. When Phillip baptized the Ethiopian Eunuch in Acts 8:34-39 , Luke tells us that they "both went down into the water" Both going down into the water would not have been necessary unless there was to be an immersion. After the Baptism of Jesus in Matthew 3:13-17 , it is recorded that "he went up from the water," which heavily implies that He had previously been down in the water. Why would He have been down in the water unless it was to be immersed?

ample places to fully immerse this many believers in Jerusalem due to Jewish ritual cleansing which was part of daily life. There was the Pool of Bethesda (John 5:1-17), the Pool of Siloam (John 9:1-12), and dozens of *mikveh* (Jewish ritual baths) at the southern end of the temple mount. Consider that Jewish people always understood what Baptism meant because it was ingrained into their culture. Ritual cleansing was not a sprinkling or pouring but was a full immersion in water. Neither Jesus, nor His disciples, ever had to explain this to their fellow Jews.
