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<u>Overview of Samuel</u> - It is important to note that Samuel was originally one book (story) that spanned two scrolls due to its overall length. This division of scrolls ultimately led to Samuel being split into two books in our modern Bibles. However, because this is only one story, understanding the overall themes of Samuel, and the events that led up to II Samuel, are critical for beginning this study. The book of Samuel primarily concerns three main characters: Samuel, Saul, & David:

- 1 Samuel 1-7: Hannah and the Rise of Samuel
- 1 Samuel 8-31: The Downfall of Saul and Rise of David
- 2 Samuel 1-20: God's Covenant with King David (and David's Failure)
- 2 Samuel 21-24: Epilogue and the Hope for a Greater David

and offe	fers a beautiful lamentation for Saul and Jonathan. Fr	om a human perspective this is a shocking response

toward one who had repeatedly tried to kill him. David recognized that Saul was God's anointed and consistently deferred to the will of God. This is an incredible demonstration of humility (one of the main themes of Samuel).
