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This marks the beginning of Absalom's insurrection against David, and David's abandoning of Jerusalem. While
chapter 15 begins with the familiar phrase "After this" ("In the course of time" $\it NIV84$), which doesn't alway
signify a chronological order, it appears as though all of this occurs after David's audience with Absalom in 14:33
P of the Abandoning (15:1-12) - Absalom is growing strong and beginning to build up
allegiances in Jerusalem. He rises early every morning and stands by the city gate. He inserts himself into the
lives of those who were coming for an audience with the king regarding lawsuits or disputes and would counsel
them by taking their side. Think of this like a politician "shaking hands and kissing babies" to build influence and
popularity for an upcoming election. He did this for <i>four years</i> ("forty" in NKJV is unlikely) and "stole the hearts
of the men of Israel". Absalom asks David if he can go to Hebron to sacrifice in fulfillment of a vow to God. This
request was a guise as he was executing a "conspiracy" to take the throne. 200 men leave the city with Absalom
but are unaware of his purpose. Once outside Jerusalem, Absalom sends spies throughout the land with a
message to be ready for his call. Absalom calls the King's counselor Ahithophel the Gilonite to join him.
Pfor the Abandoning (15:13-21) - After David receives a message concerning Absalom's
actions, he instructs all his servants to flee Jerusalem and escape before Absalom attacks. David and all his
servants abandon the city, leaving only 10 concubines to maintain his house. Also leaving with David were the
bodyguards (mercenaries) from the Cherethites and Pelethites (2 Sam 8:18). The Gittites from Gath (600 men)
also followed him. David indicates to Itta the Gittite that he does not yet know where he is going.
P in the Abandoning (15:22-16:14) - <u>Brook Kidron</u> - The group crosses over the Brook
Kidron on the west side of Jerusalem. Zadok (2 Sam 8:17) and Abiathar (2 Sam 22:20) carried the Ark of the
Covenant. David tells Zadok to go back and indicates that if the LORD is with him, then He will "bring me back".
He also says that if the LORD rejects him "Let Him do to me as seems good to Him". David tells Zadok and
Abiathar that he "will wait in the plains" until he receives word from them to return. Mount of Olives - David
leads the people up the mount, weeping as he goes with his head covered and his feet bare. When David learns
that Ahithophel has joined Absalom, he prays that his counsel will turn "into foolishness". At the top, David
worships and recruits Hushai the Archite to be his spy in Absalom's house. Hushai is to report everything he
hears to Zadok and Abiathar. He encounters Ziba (2 Sam 9:2), the servant of Mephibosheth, who has two
saddled donkeys, 200 loaves of bread, 100 clusters of raisins, 100 summer fruits, and a skin of wine. Ziba says
these items are for the king's household and his followers. David asks about Mephibosheth, and Ziba says that h
has remained in Jerusalem saying, "Today the house of Israel will restore the kingdom of my father to me". This i
a claim that will later be disputed by Mephibosheth in 2 Sam 19:26 . David believes Ziba and says that he will give
all Mephibosheth's possessions to him. <u>Bahurim</u> - When David arrives in this village, he encounters Shimei, son
of Gera, who is another from the household of Saul. Shimei is cursing David and casting stones. Shimei says that
David is receiving what is deserved for taking the kingdom from Saul. Abishai wants to cut off Shimei's head, but
David refuses to let anyone in his company retaliate, again deferring to the will of the LORD.
Pafter the Abandoning (15:37, 16:15-23) - As David leaves Jerusalem, Absalom moves
in with his army and occupies his father's city. He is joined by Ahithophel, David's former counselor. Hushai
arrives and begins working to win Absalom's favor to become David's spy. Absalom asks for advice from
Ahithophel, who counsels that Absalom should go to his father's 10 concubines who have remained in
Jerusalem. This was to be done as a show of strength and to further be "abhorred by [David]". Absalom heeds
the advice of Ahithophel and pitches his tent at David's house. It is at this point the text says that advice given by
Ahithopel was taken as from "the oracle of God".
