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B. David's Mighty Men (23:8–39)

A. The Lord's Wrath Against Israel (24:1–25)

You can see an example of the symmetry by examining the last verse of sections one (A) and six (A). Both contain the phrase "God/the Lord heeded the prayer(s) for the land".

C_______ of the Famine (21:1-2) - In this lesson, we will focus on section one, which documents a time during the reign of David when there was a three-year famine in Israel. Lengthy famines were relatively common in antiquity (Gen 12:10; 26:1; 41:54–57; Ruth 1:1; 2 Kings 4:38), so it should not be surprising to find there was a time of famine during the 40-year reign of David. However, when David inquires of the Lord as to the reason for the famine, God tells David, "It is because of Saul and his bloodthirsty house, because he killed the Gibeonites" (21:1). To understand the context of this response requires going back hundreds of years to Joshua 9 where Joshua was tricked by the Gibeonites into making a promise that Israel would not destroy them in the land of Canaan. Gibeon was just north of Jerusalem, but the Gibeonites were not part of Israel. Though we don't have a record of Saul's actions, God is telling David that Saul has violated the promise.

of the Famine (21:3-14) - David seeks out the Gibeonites to make atonement. It appears David wants to reconcile with the Gibeonites, and then for them to pray the Lord's blessing on Israel "that you may bless the inheritance of the Lord" (21:3). The Gibeonites indicate they have no right to demand (1) silver or gold from Saul's Family, or (2) the death of anyone in Israel. Instead, the Gibeonites ask that seven men of Saul's house be executed "before the Lord" in "Gibeah of Saul" (21:6). Gibeah was the hometown of king Saul (1 Sam 10:26). David agrees to their request, but why? Was David right or wrong? Was this the Lord's will? This is a challenging section to interpret, but the answer may lie within the Law of Moses:

Num 35:33 - You shall not pollute the land in which you live, for blood pollutes the land, and no atonement can be made for the land for the blood that is shed in it, except by the blood of the one who shed it.

It is possible this act was necessary to pay for the "bloodguilt on Saul and on his house" (21:1 - ESV). In selecting the seven men, David spares Jonathan's son Mephibosheth (*Saul's grandson*), because of the covenant David made with Jonathan (1 Sam 20:14-17). David instead selects Armoni and Mephibosheth, sons of Saul and Rizpah his concubine (3:7), along with five sons of Saul's daughter Merab (1 Sam 14:49 / NKJV - "Michal"). They were hanged on the mountain "before the Lord". This occurred on the first days of harvest (21:9 / late April).

Rizpah mourns her sons and spreads sackcloth on a rock until rain comes. She protects the bodies from the birds of the air and beasts of the field. When David heard of Rizpah's actions, he retrieved the bones of Saul and Jonathan from Jabesh-Gilead (1 Sam 31:8-13), along with the bones of those executed, and buried them in Zela in Kish's tomb (father of Saul). This section ends by telling us that God answered the prayers of the Israelites.
