B_______(**3-8**) - Why does Jesus use the metaphor of being "born" to describe what is necessary to be a part of the "kingdom of God" (v. 3)? The metaphor of "birth" or "creation" was used by the apostles John (**John 1:10-13**), Paul (**2Co 5:17; Gal 6:15**), and Peter (**1Pe 1:3, 23**) to describe our relationship to Jesus. Birth represents an entrance into life, so Jesus describes our entrance into a new spiritual life as being "born again".

As will become a theme in John (**John 4:15; 6:34**), Nicodemus cannot get his mind above the physical concept of birth. This is why he asks the question about entering His mother's womb a second time (**v. 4**). His confusion is understandable, because, like all of us, he lived in the natural world. Jesus is trying to get him to see beyond the physical and consider the spiritual. Accepting Jesus is the beginning of something new.

Jesus' follow-up about being "born of water and Spirit" (v. 5) is clearly an allusion to one's baptism into Christ. Later, Peter will tell the great crowd gathered in Jerusalem for Pentecost that to accept Christ, they must "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38). Baptism is not just a ceremony. It represents our receiving God's Holy Spirit and the beginning of our new life in Christ (Rom 6:1-4). We are "born again"!

Jesus goes on to explain that we have our first fleshly birth, then those who accept Christ in baptism have a second spiritual birth (**v. 6**). As we see from Jesus' continued explanations, Nicodemus is struggling with the "How" of this new spiritual birth (**v. 7**). Jesus uses an illustration about the working of the wind (**v. 8**) to explain that one does not need to be able to understand **How** the Spirit works to bring about the new birth in our baptism. God is beyond our comprehension, and His working will always be a mystery to us while on this earth (**Rom 11:33**).
