

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Outline of John 12

- I. Jesus is Anointed in Bethany (1-11)
- II. Jesus is Acclaimed in Jerusalem (12-50)

The Triumphal Entry (12-19) – Jesus' entry into Jerusalem takes place five days before Passover. He is ready to formally present Himself as the Messiah and to fulfill His mission. This event is recorded in all four of the gospels" (The "synoptics" → Matthew 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-10, and Luke 19:28-40). The P_____(12-13a; Mt 21:1-3, 6-8; Mk 11:1-8; Lk 19:28-37) - A "large" crowd has gathered along the road to welcome Jesus. John records that this crowd is made up of two groups. The first group consists of the people who had come to Jerusalem for the Passover feast. In John's account we only read about them bringing palm branches, but the synoptics record that the people spread their cloaks on the road along with the branches as he travelled down the Mount of Olives toward Jerusalem. ______ (13; Mt 21:8-9; Mk 11:8-10; Lk 19:37-38) - Those who covered the road, also covered Jesus with shouts of acclaim. The shouts include a quote from Psalm 118:25-26, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" They are proclaiming Jesus as the Messiah and future King of Israel. To this "King," they shout "Hosanna", which is an expression that means "save me". This is likely a plea to save them from Roman oppression, instead of asking for spiritual salvation. Matthew and Mark record that their shouts included a reference to Jesus being a descendant of David (2Sam 7:12-13; Ps 89:3-4, Isa 9:6-7; 11:1-10; Jer 23:5-6; Mt 1:1; Lk 1:26-33). The P______(14-16; Mt 21:4-5) — Unlike a human king, Jesus rides into Jerusalem like a commoner on a business trip. John does not record Jesus' instructions regarding the acquisition of the colt as found in the synoptics, but He and Matthew both note that this event is a fulfillment of prophecy found in Zech 9:9. "Daughter of Zion" is a personification of Jerusalem, which occurs frequently in the prophets (Isa 1:8; 52:2; 62:11; Jer 4:31; 6:23; Lam 2:4, 8, 10, 13; Mic 4:8; Zeph 3:14; Zech 2:10). The disciples did not make this connection at first, but later after understood the fulfillment of Zecheriah's prophecy "when [He] was glorified". In His time on earth, Jesus fulfilled over 300 prophecies. The P_____(17-18) - We learn of the second group that had come with Jesus for His entry into Jerusalem. These are the ones who witnessed the raising of Lazarus (11:45). We are told they continued to "bear witness" about what Jesus had done and were the reason why so many had come to meet Him on His way into Jerusalem. They were spreading the "good news" about Jesus. (19; Lk 19:39-40) - Upon witnessing this event, the Pharisees are afraid their plot to take Jesus down (11:49-53) might be too late. Luke records that they tried to silence Jesus'

disciples. To this He responded, "I tell you, if these were silent, the very stones would cry out."
