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## You Only Have I Known (Amos 3:2)

We have recently been going through a *survey* of the Minor Prophets on Sunday evenings. I've been transparent about my shortcomings when attempting to deliver lessons that summarize a section of scripture or a book of the Bible. The root of this struggle comes from the inevitable encounters with passages where I want to dig much deeper than a survey will allow.

This past Sunday, while covering the book of Amos, one of these types of passages appeared:

**Amos 3:2 (ESV)** "You only have I known of all the families of the earth; therefore I will punish you for all your iniquities.

There is SO MUCH to unpack here! Amos prophesied God's Word to Israel (1:1) just before their defeat by the Assyrians in 722 B.C. (II Kings 17). The verse above comes amid God's message concerning their religious hypocrisy (5:10-13, 21-24), idolatry (3:13–15), and impending exile (6:7).

When God says, "You only have I known of all the families of the earth", it carries the idea that He had given them EVERYTHING as His chosen people (Gen 12:1-3). Consider Paul's words about the Jews:

Romans 9:4–5 (ESV) - They are Israelites, and to them belong the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the law, the worship, and the promises. To them belong the patriarchs, and from their race, according to the flesh, is the Christ, who is God over all, blessed forever.

Since God had given them EVERYTHING, He expected faithfulness to Him in return! They had countless opportunities to demonstrate their **faithfulness** but had instead **failed** Him over and over again. In view of their repeated failures, God tells them He has no choice but to "punish you for all your iniquites."

<u>What About Us?</u> God's chosen people are no longer defined by race or nation. His people are now those who follow His Son with faith (**Rom 3:21-26; 9:6; Gal 3:7-9**). However, similar to the physical nation of Israel, God has given us EVERYTHING through Jesus. Again, consider the words of Paul:

Romans 5:6–11 (ESV) - For while we were still <u>weak</u>, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die— but God shows his love for us in that while we were still <u>sinners</u>, Christ died for us. Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. For if while we were <u>enemies</u> we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life. More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

We were completely and totally unworthy (weak, sinners, enemies), but Christ gave us His life, His EVERYTHING, so we can be "saved by His life". What does He expect in return? He expects us to be faithful to Him in EVERYTHING we do (**Col 3:17**). This morning, let's consider our lives in view of what we have been given. Does our life exhibit **faithfulness** or **failure** toward God?
